Your child may be eligible if he or she

- ✓ has a valid Alberta Personal Health number or card
- ✓ requires assessment, diagnosis, treatment, support services and/or medical care

Seniors and Community Supports

Alberta Aids to Daily Living (AADL)

Your child may be eligible if he or she

- ✓ has a valid Alberta Personal Health number or card
- ✓ was assessed by a qualified health professional
- ✓ requires the benefit due to a long term disability or illness (6 months or longer) or is end-stage palliative
- ✓ meets additional eligibility criteria for a specific benefit
- ✓ has a valid authorization form completed and signed by a registered AADL authorizer

Children's Services

Family Support for Children with Disabilities (FSCD)

Your child may be eligible if he or she

- ✓ has been diagnosed as having a disability or chronic health condition or impairment that significantly limits the child's ability to participate in normal daily living, *if the primary need is not for medical health care services*

Inclusive Child Care

Your child may be eligible if he or she

- ✓ is 7 years old or under and not in Grade 1
- ✓ has assessed developmental needs that present a barrier to successful inclusion in a child care program

First priority is given to children of parents who work, attend post-secondary education/training or who may themselves have a special need.

Education

Your child may be eligible if, on September 1, he or she is

- ✓ 2½ to 5 years old with a diagnosed severe disability/delay that has a very significant impact on the child's safety and/or ability to learn
- OR
- ✓ 3½ to 5 years old and assessed as having a mild/moderate disability/delay that interferes with the child's safety and/or ability to learn

The purpose of this brochure is to provide basic information about the kinds of services funded by the government of Alberta to support the development of young children who have special needs. Based on assessed need, services range from specific, short-term help to comprehensive, ongoing support. These services are funded primarily through four distinct-but-linked provincial ministries: Education, Health and Wellness, Children's Services, and Seniors and Community Supports.

Ensuring that children are safe, healthy and ready to learn is the most important goal of any society. Investing in families and communities through services that support healthy child development creates the foundation for a strong society and economy.
